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This is the second installment in what will be an ongoing crowdsourcing project to connect the collective memory of today's Wheeling community to its historical resources and stories. A picture is worth a thousand words, and the more we know about the photos that tell Wheeling's stories, the better we are able to uncover important and sometimes forgotten histories of our community.

WHAT IS "CROWDSOURCING"?

Crowdsourcing history is reaching out to the wider community to solicit help and knowledge in preserving, discovering, diversifying, and communicating history. History is not just created by or for trained historians—it is made up of stories, secrets, documents, memories, and more that are preserved by everyday people. Historians verify, analyze, and interpret history, but the entire community is responsible for maintaining and expanding the histories, stories, and narratives that create the foundations of their society. Sometimes history's mysteries just need someone with the right key.

Photo 2: Wheeling Business and Professional Women's Club, 1927 National Convention



Organized in 1918, the Wheeling Chapter of the BPWC was founded by nurses, teachers, principals, telephone operators, pastors, and librarians. Providing a space for Wheeling's professionals to advance the role of women in the workplace, the organization was also involved in many philanthropic endeavors. Past BPWC chairwoman Mattie L. Miner is believed to be the woman labeled #5. According the Wheeling Intelligencer, several other Wheeling women attended the convention including (spellings may be incorrect): Miss Stella Shary, Miss Mary Alexander, Miss Striff, Miss Marion Llewellyn, and Miss Glendora Johnson. Can you match any names to women in the photo?

Photo 2: Hazel Atlas Glass Company Employees in front of the Wheeling Factory, 19th and Jacob St., 1935



In addition to its iconic home canning jars, Hazel Atlas was a major producer of inexpensive "Depression Glass" table sets of pink, green, blue, colorless, and black glass. From 1930 to the 1950s, Hazel Atlas was the largest glass company in the United States. The company's headquarters were located at 87 15th Street in Wheeling. Did any of your relatives work for Hazel-Atlas? Do you see them in this photograph?

Photo 3: Girl Scout Camp Staff at Camp Giscowheco, 1976




