THE GEM THEATER - Everyone remembers the Lincoln Theatre, but the first moving picture theater in Warwood was the Gem Theater (late 1900s, 1920s). Leon Herbert "Lee" Hoffmann owned and operated the first movie house, called the Gem Theater, at 1813 Warwood Avenue. From the entrance on Warwood Avenue, the theater had a long, narrow passageway to the rear of the building where the motion pictures were shown. An ice cream parlor was located beside the front entrance. Later, a pool room was added. Mr. Hoffman's occupations were listed in the City Directories as tobaconist, confectioner and stogie roller. He and his first wife Lottie Lee Winder had 2 sons: Leon Herbert Hoffmann, Jr. and Winder Hoffmann. He died in St. Petersburg, Florida in November 1960 and is buried in Greenwood Cemetery in Wheeling.
